## What are other jurisdictions doing to address this issue?

That was the question brought forth, and after some conversation and sub sequential research the following is a list of best practices for you to consider. The following are links from neighboring communities in Georgia, as well as those outside the state. Should you have any other resources not listed in this newsletter, we would love to hear from you!

In Gwinnett County, an ordinance has been put into place to guide the location of telecommunication towers and antennas. The goals outlined include encouraging their location in non-residential areas, encourage the joint use for current and new towers, and encouraging design in order to minimize the "adverse visual impact." <u>co.gwinnett.ga.us/departments/planning/pdf/tower.pdf</u>

Similarly, the purpose of the telecommunication antenna and tower ordinances for both the Cities of Hahira and Valdosta seek to encourage the coexistence of telecommunication towers with other land uses. In addition, this ordinance seeks to encourage "innovative uses of alternative tower structures such as church steeples, outdoor advertising signs, electric transmission towers where technologically feasible." sgrdc.com/GLPC/Ordinacnes/Valdosta%20Telecomm% 20Ord.pdf

The telecommunication tower ordinance in place for Albemarle County, Virginia takes the unique stance of encouraging antennas and towers to be constructed as long as they do not rise above tree-top height. Since this height will ultimately fluctuate, the ordinance allows the height of the tower to increase in respect to the tree-top height. This is just one of the many objectives outlined in this ordinance, which serves as a best practice for its innovative technique. www.albemarle.org/department.asp?department=planning&relpage=2462
