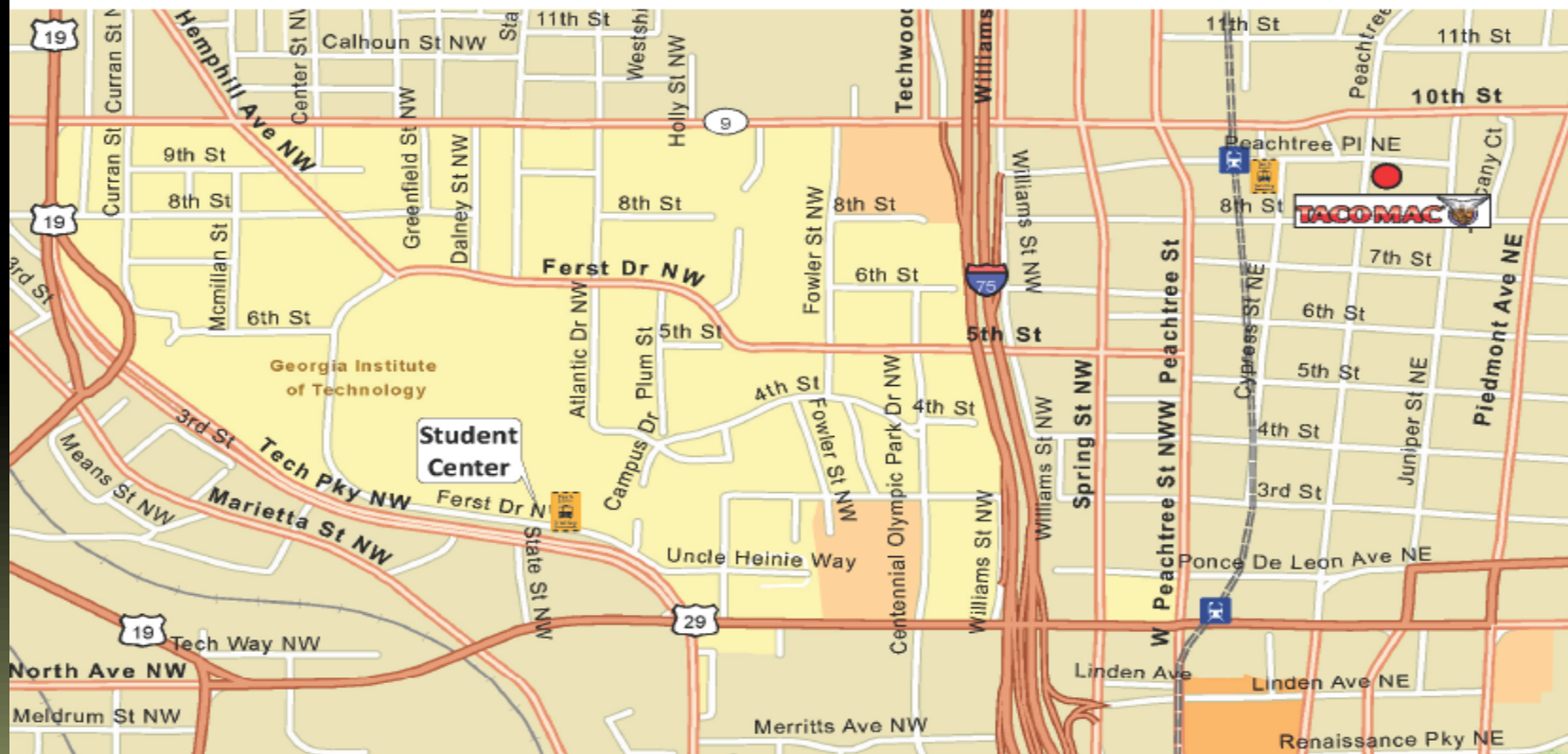

# AICP Exam Preparation

## On Exam Day

- Arrive 30 minutes early
- Bring 2 forms of ID (passport, driver's license, SSA Card, etc.)
- Name on ID MUST match name on your ATT
- Calculator and scratch paper are provided
- Bring your watch and a sweater
- Take no books or reference materials in

# AICP Exam Review

## Computer Based Exam

- 4 hour exam
- Starts with a 15-minute Tutorial
- 170 Questions
  - 150 Count Toward Your Score
  - 20 Pre-Test Questions NOT Scored
- Scaled score of 55 or greater is passing

# AICP Exam Review

## Two Main Areas

- Knowledge – 40% - history, law, ethics, land use, demographic trends, etc.
- Skills – 60% - demonstrate ability to work within a planning process, formulate goals, use appropriate technical methods, involve public, think long term

Many questions require professional judgment, combined with technical knowledge

# AICP Exam Review

## Nature of the Content

- More breadth of subject matter than depth
- Emphasis on public agency management
- Situations: “What would you do if...” questions
- Familiarity with the public planning process: planner’s roles vs. elected officials, applications of technical knowledge, analysis of alternatives, ethics, public interest, and public involvement in decision-making

# Tips for Taking the Exam

- Go through the exam at least twice
- First time : answer “easy” questions
- Use ‘Mark’ function for hard questions, and move on!
- After the first run through check your watch
- Go through the second (or third) time for ‘Mark’d questions and answer ALL questions
- Enter your best guess - no penalty for wrong answers
- Check all the other questions, but be careful about “second-guessing”!

# AICP Exam Review

Your score is determined by the number of questions you answer correctly. Therefore it is to your advantage to answer every question. If you are unsure of your answer, you can mark the question to review if time permits.

# Review Features

## To review questions

Click on the **Review All** button. You will be moved to the first question. Clicking on the **Next** button will cause you to move to the next question. You can also double-click on the question number in the list to move to a particular question.



## To review marked questions

Click on the **Review Marked** button. You will be moved to the first marked question. Clicking on the **Next** button will cause you to move to the next marked question.



## To review incomplete questions

Click on the **Review Incomplete** button. You will be moved to the first incomplete question. Clicking on the **Next** button will cause you to move to the next incomplete question.



# AICP Exam Review

## Scoring the AICP Exam

- Score Reports ONLY to You - Confidential
- Chapter PDO receives notification of Passing Candidates only
- Scaled Scoring
  - Range from a Low of 25 to a High of 75
  - Passing is 55 or greater
  - NOT a percentage

# AICP Exam Review

## Scoring the AICP Exam

- Immediate notification at end of Exam
- Diagnostic Reports
  - If you do not pass, a report of your raw score in each area is provided to assist in preparing for reexamination

# AICP Exam Review

## Tips and Suggestions

- Talk to other AICP Planners
- Study Group – E-mail lists
- Rely on Your Experience as a Planner
- Exam Statistics – Caution:
  - Pass rates vary by Chapter, age, etc.
  - No control over HOW candidates prepare

# AICP Exam Review

## Tips and Suggestions

- Look at Percentage of Emphasis by Topic to Guide your Exam Preparation
- National Examination
  - Avoid Georgia-centric Thinking on Exam

# AICP Exam Review

## Tips and Suggestions

- **Professional Exam**
  - Very important certification as AICP
  - Follows **You** – not your employer - through your Career
- **Responsibilities of Being a member of AICP**
  - Continuing Education (32 hours every 2 years)
  - Code of Ethics
  - Professional Activities
  - Service

## Tips and Suggestions

Avoid the dreaded Dopeler effect!

*Dopeler effect: The tendency of stupid ideas to seem smarter when they come at you rapidly.*
