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It won't be long - this is my last contribution to the President's Corner! I will gladly surrender this "bully pulpit" to your new President, Jerry Weitz. You can look forward to new ideas, fresh energy and strong leadership from Jerry and new members of the Board. I am not disappearing, but look forward to playing some new roles on the Board. In particular, as Past-President, I see the need to press three important priorities to the Board next year planning legislation, planning education, and communication.

Legislation: One thing that I care passionately about is pushing planning to the next level with better legislation and better tools for planners in Georgia. Many of the planning tools that have been tested and used successfully in other states are not legally or politically feasible in Georgia. Each year that goes by without the tools we need is a year closer to crisis (transportation, air quality, water quality, water supply, affordable housing) and further from the quality of life that future Georgians want and need. This will be a ten year effort. Join me in forming a braintrust for better planning legislation.

Education: Planning education is another arena of crisis and opportunity. I am not talking about the quality of planning instruction at Georgia Tech and our other colleges and universities. They are among the best in the nation. However, there is huge gap between the level of planning education available through our colleges, and the level of planning practice in the hundreds of local planning commissions and planning departments in Georgia. (That is the only place where it really matters!) We need to dedicate a substantial share of our effort in GPA to the continuing education of practicing planners and planning officials. We must narrow the gap between theory and practice by increasing the call to planners and Planning Commissioners to seek continuing education, and by improving the availability of interesting and relevant courses. GPA is getting ready to roll out the Community Planning Institute for this winter. GPA is also working with DCA, Atlanta Regional

Commission, UGA and Ga Tech to develop a statewide, coordinated approach to continuing education for planners and Planning Commissioners. Join this effort.

By the way, a recent survey by the APA Planning and Women Division found that the top three ways practicing planners prefer to learn is #1 - through Workshops (like CPI); #2 - from one-on-one peer exchange; and #3 - from statewide Planning Conferences (like we are about to have in Savannah). Join GPA at the Fall Conference Oct. 22-24, and join me in developing more opportunities for peer exchange.

Communication: Finally, none of the great ideas we have will go anywhere without better communications. How well do we communicate with each other about professional practice? What do non-planners know about us? How can we have more influence in the things that matter legislation, housing, land economics, and natural resource management? The APA has just published a written Communications Plan that delves into some of these questions.

Hats off to our GPA Chapter Services Committee and Membership Sub-committee because they have a first draft of a new GPA brochure a first cut at putting our message into an attractive and easy to pass-along format. Join me in passing the message along.

This only begs the question, "What IS our message"? Do we need a GPA Communications Committee? Think about that and let me know what you think.

This advanced land use mapping standard is now an option for use under the Revised Minimum Planning Standards for Local Comprehensive Planning. Sanjay Jeer, APA's principal investigator on the LBCS project, will present this daylong workshop. 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Blueprints Partners News & Notes

The Blueprints Partners are involved in several ongoing projects around the State. Here is a highlight of recent activities:

The **Home Park** Community Improvement Association presented a copy of the award it recently received from the Georgia Planning Association for its Greater Home Park Master Plan to the Georgia Conservancy at the Conservancy's Executive Committee meeting in July. One of the first Blueprints technical assistance workshops was done in Home Park and this led to the community's desire to complete and implement a master plan for their area. The Conservancy has been involved since the original workshop as a master plan steering committee member and as a sounding board for ideas about fundraising for plan implementation.

The Blueprints **Macon** workshop has focused on applying for a National Heritage Corridor (NHC) designation for a portion of the Ocmulgee River. The draft NHC study was presented to the Macon steering committee on May 21. A subcommittee of the group is focusing on increasing the amount of public participation around the NHC study and process. On July 1 that subcommittee met and outlined plans for the next several months with the first step being a release of the draft NHC study to the steering committee members for their review. The Macon steering committee will discuss the study at it's September 22 meeting. Once approved by the steering committee, the NHC study will then be shared with an expanded steering committee in an effort to increase stakeholder input into the process.

Meetings are being coordinated throughout the **Lower Chattahoochee RDC** with the county staff in the RDC's eight-county region. These meetings are an opportunity to educate county staff and elected officials about the Middle Chattahoochee Blueprints project. Presentations will be made about this Blueprints project at the Clay and Harris County Commission meetings in October.

Blueprints staff met with the director of the Savannah College of Art and Design's (SCAD) Building Arts department to discuss SCAD's involvement in a community design workshop for **Sandfly**, a historic African-American community near Savannah. Blueprints has been working with the community since early 2002 and a workshop is tentatively planned for fall quarter. The Georgia Conservancy has begun working with other SCAD departments in preparation for the workshop.

The Blueprints Partners recently completed its project in **Conyers and Rockdale County**. Drawing on affected property owners, elected officials, and both City and County staff, the Partners directed a series of workshops that produced a future land use plan for an area encompassing brownfield redevelopment, retail strip center redevelopment, new development, and the incorporation of infrastructure improvements into the area.
