North Georgia, the 4th Largest Megapolitan Area in 2040

A July 11th, 2005 USA Today article and map provided some important national perspective on the future of north Georgia. The article was outlining the forecast for the ten largest metro areas in the U.S. by the year 2040. With the U.S. forecasted to grow from 295 million to 420 million by 2050, the article outlined that the Atlanta based southern megapolitan area will stretch from Raleigh, N.C. to Birmingham and have a population of 19.3 million people.


The Piedmont area will be the 4th largest megapolitan area in the U.S. following New York (50.4 million), Chicago (40.1 million) and Los Angeles (22.2 million). The 8 largest super-city regions are forecasted by the University of Pennsylvania to have more than 300 million people or 70% of the U.S. population. For those of you that think growth

GPA Legislative Alert

Eminent Domain Issue: This is defined as the right of the government to take private property for public use through a condemnation process. The 5th amendment and the GA constitution require governments to compensate the property owner with a "just compensation" for the property taken.

In the 2005 General Assembly, **SB 86** was heard and then held in committee so that the outcome of a Supreme Court case could be assessed. SB 86 would have prohibited the use of eminent domain for economic development purposes or to improve the local tax base. It would also prohibit governments from transferring condemned property to a private developer for the same purpose.

Last month the Supreme Court ruled in the case of Kelo vs. the City of New London that the eminent domain process could continue for economic development purposes. Since that time many legislative leaders in Georgia have vowed to work towards a constitutional amendment in the upcoming session that would forbid eminent domain for economic development purposes.

<u>Inverse Condemnation</u>: This is an action brought against a government by a property owner claiming that a "taking" or "regulatory taking" has occurred without a formal eminent domain process. Thus, the property cannot be used for its original purpose. In Inverse Condemnation cases a court decides whether a taking has occurred and then refers the case to a special master who establishes value.

In the 2005 session **SB 30** on Inverse Condemnation was held in committee, and a study committee was established to deal with the matter further. SB 30 would allow a property owner making an inverse condemnation claim against a local government to use the special master process without courts determination first. More importantly, it is the intent of the legislative sponsors of this bill to expand the definition of a "taking" so as to require local governments to pay property owners for any reduction in value of their property due to regulatory requirements such as tree ordinances, stream buffers or even zoning decisions to adjacent property that would have a diminutive impact.

Currently a study committee is working towards reworking the bill and perhaps introducing it as a constitutional amendment. It is too early to determine what the new bill will entail or how dramatically it will impact local governments and the comprehensive planning process in Georgia. However, thus far in the process we have seen no signs that the legislative sponsors are willing to scale back on the expansive nature of the intent of the bill.

The study committee will hear public comment during the next two meetings; one in August and one in the fall. Meanwhile attorneys from Southeastern Legal Foundation and Pacific Foundation are assisting in drafting new legislation.

In the Forefront: Inverse Condemnation

July 28th, I attended a joint ACCG/GMA sponsored meeting on the issue of SB 30 and the concept of "Inverse Condemnation." The meeting was well attended by many attorneys, local government legislative staff and non-profit organizations. The meeting was held in anticipation of a second meeting of a Senate study committee on Inverse Condemnation that is tentatively scheduled for August 25th in Savannah.

ACCG and GMA staffs believe SB 30 and another anticipated bill, currently being written by the SE Legal Foundation and Pacific Foundation, are serious threats to the planning and zoning regulatory environment in Georgia. Recent editorials in the wake of the Supreme Court Kelo v. City of New London decision, 2006 election and the difficulty for citizens to understand the complexities and public good associated with various regulations such as stream buffers, make Georgia fertile ground for property rights advocates.

GPA needs to get up to speed quickly and take this issue seriously. I committed to helping ACCG and GMA staff locate various items such as: 1) National research on the beneficial effects of zoning and other regulations on protection of property values; 2) Copy of an APA Land Use Law report on statewide taking legislation; 3) Good examples in Georgia of how zoning and development regulations benefit communities, homeowners, down stream property owners, etc.

I offer the following possible GPA actions for Debbie Miness, the Legislative Committee and the GPA Board to consider: 1) Distribute a summary for GPA membership on the issue [see the GPA Legislative Alert inside this issue]; 2) Seek members on the Georgia coast to attend and testify at the August 25th meeting; 3) Hold a session at the GPA Fall conference. 4) Develop a short summary of good examples where zoning regulations provide clear public benefits and protect property values.

While it is possible that the Inverse Condemnation issue may lose support, it is equally possible that this time next year Georgia could have a new law and/or proposed constitutional amendment that is a combination of Proposition 37 from Oregon with the Bert-Harris act of Florida. Such a law could have serious impacts in clogging the wheels and thus slowing down legitimate zoning and regulatory activity, engaging local governments in substantial litigation and likely tax and economic consequences.
