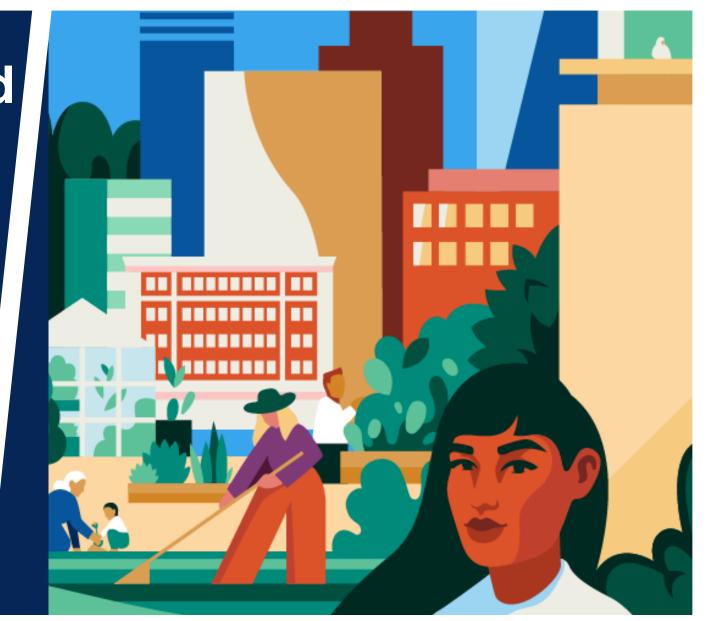

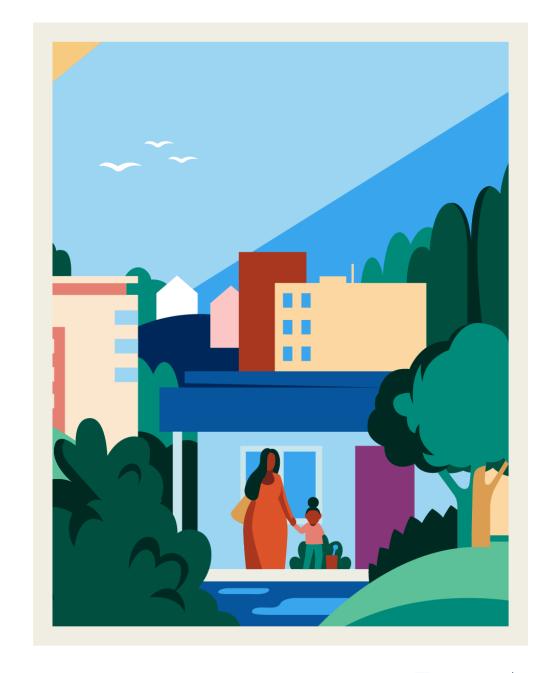


HOUSING TRUST FUNDS **OVERVIEW**

What is a Housing Trust Fund?

Distinct fund established by city, county, or state governments by law or ordinance to support the preservation and production of affordable housing

 A housing trust fund can also support homeownership initiatives, programs for people experiencing homelessness, land acquisition for community land trusts, rental assistance for low-income individuals, disaster recovery, etc.



Housing Trust Funds Nationwide

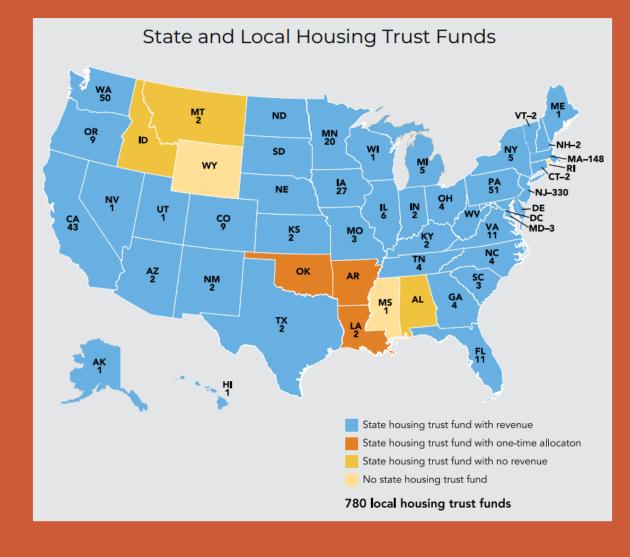
What is the landscape?

Nearly every state in the U.S. has a state housing trust fund.

- 48 states and the District of Columbia have created statewide housing trust funds.
- Several specifically address homelessness.

City housing trust funds exist in at least 36 states, and county housing trust funds exist in at least 20.

There are over 780 local housing trust funds in the U.S.

Common Considerations for Housing Trust Funds

Who administers the trust fund?

- Existing government agency
- Establish a new, independent authority or board

Specifying uses

- For example, specifying a certain percentage of funds must serve households at or below 30% AMI or 50% AMI
- Repair, rehab, construction

How are the funds distributed?

- Competitive application process
- Channel funds through existing programs

How is it funded?

- Annual appropriations from a general fund
- Private donations, philanthropy
- Dedicated revenue

Example Sources of Dedicated Revenue Nationwide

Taxes

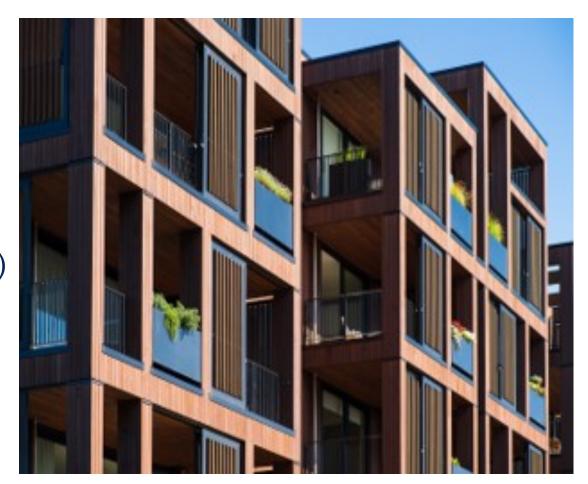
- Real estate transfer tax (used Florida, South Carolina, Pennsylvania, Iowa)
- Tax on Airbnb hosts (Nashville, TN)
- Portion of property tax (Denver, CO)

Fees

- Document recording fees related to real estate (used in Indiana, Oregon, Kentucky)
- Developer fees (Denver, CO)

Other

- Sale of unclaimed property (Arizona)
- Interest from certain accounts (for example, real estate escrow or title escrow)



HOUSING TRUST FUNDS LANDSCAPE IN GEORGIA

Georgia State Housing Trust Fund for the Homeless

- Annual appropriation from the state budget
- Used to leverage federal funding
- Has existed for more than 3 decades
- Non-lapsing funds
- Currently supports organizations that serve homeless or imminently homeless households and provide:
 - Emergency shelter
 - Street outreach
 - Rapid rehousing
 - Homelessness prevention

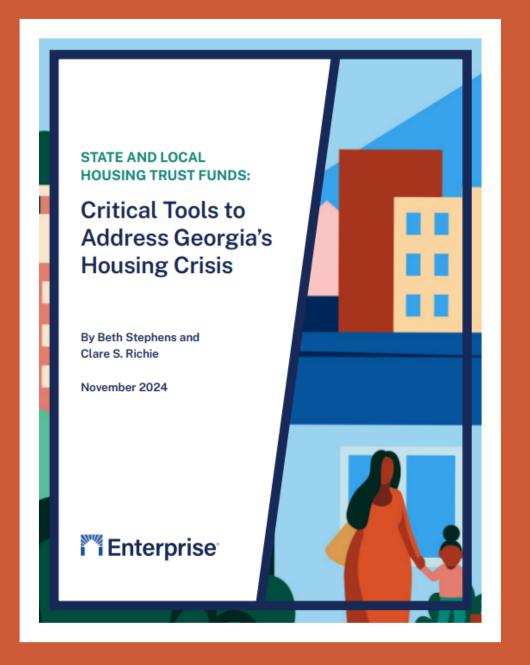


Local Housing Trust Funds in Georgia

Cities and counties in Georgia have the authority to create a local housing trust fund and annually appropriate existing funding to it.

Existing local Georgia affordable housing funds include:

- City of Atlanta Building the Beloved **Community Housing Trust Fund**
- Macon-Bibb County Affordable Housing Fund
- City of Decatur Decatur Housing Trust Fund
- Savannah Affordable Housing Fund



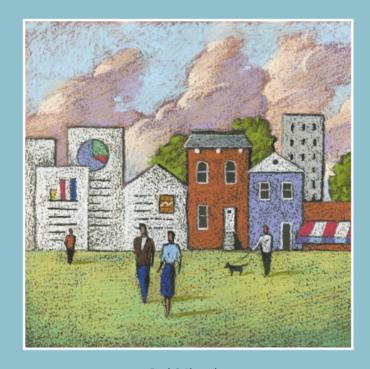
LOCAL-LEVEL OPPORTUNITIES

Dedicating Revenue to Local Housing Trust Funds

- Authorization from the Georgia General Assembly would be required for a local government to expand its authority to levy new or additional taxes in order to dedicate those funds to a housing trust fund.
- State legislation that enables cities and counties in Georgia to expand revenue sources available for dedication would give localities more options to fund and advance local housing trust funds.

Florida's Housing Trust Funds

The Sadowski Act and Sadowski Coalition

Sadowski Act

- The Sadowski Coalition came together in 1991 to obtain a dedicated revenue source for Florida's affordable housing programs.
- The William E. Sadowski Act (passed in 1992) increased the document stamp tax on all real estate transactions (from \$.10 per \$100 of purchase price to \$.70 per \$100).
- 70% of money primarily supports the State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) program which distributes funds in all 67 counties and 55 cities
- 30% of money goes to the State Housing Trust Fund to support programs such as the State Apartment Incentive Loan (SAIL) program.



SHIP and SAIL

- SHIP funds can be used for down payment and closing cost assistance, new construction, rehabilitation, home repair, rental/mortgage assistance, insurance deductibles, and more. Each local government develops a Local **Housing Assistance Plan that governs its** uses of the funding within a mandated criteria
- SAIL funds can be used to rehabilitate existing apartments or to build new units where needed. SAIL provides low or no-interest loans on a competitive basis to affordable housing developers for new construction and acquisition/ rehabilitation of affordable rental housing, often as gap financing.

Nashville, TN

Barnes Housing Trust Fund



- Established in 2013 to create and preserve affordable housing in Nashville and throughout Davidson County.
- Makes competitive grants to nonprofit housing developers. Barnes Fund grants have directly invested in developing or preserving more than **6,000 units** of income-restricted affordable housing since the first grant round closed in 2014.
- **Sources of funding:** annual operating budget allocation and a portion of the Airbnb tax. To date, over \$161M has been awarded by the Barnes Fund, leveraging \$1.4B in private, philanthropic, state and federal funds (9:1 leverage).
- **Activities:** Building capacity of new and/or smaller nonprofit developers Income restricted rental and homeownership units • Prioritizing the rehabilitation of existing properties in rapidly changing areas • Prioritizing housing for populations that have been historically locked out of the city's affordable housing resources • Activating and sustaining a public land portfolio.
- **Eligible projects:** Rental projects must be affordable to HHs at or below 60% AMI; Home buyer and homeowner rehab projects must serve HHs at or below 80% AMI. Properties must remain affordable for a 30-year period.

South Carolina



Mescher Act (2007) allows municipalities, counties or regions to establish housing trust funds, spells out allowable revenue sources (budget allocations, bond proceeds, donations, grants & loans), and describes allowable uses and reporting requirements.

Accommodations tax legislation (2023):

- Local governments may allocate up to 15% of accommodations (hotel/motel) tax revenue for workforce housing initiatives (sunsets on 12/31/30). Workforce housing is defined as 30-120% of AMI. Local government must conduct a housing impact analysis.
- Revenue from this tax is also used for a variety of tourism-related purposes. This was NOT an increase in the tax. The legislation expanded the allowable uses for this tax revenue.

The **Beaufort Jasper Housing Trust** is a multi-jurisdictional housing trust fund

- August 2021 study made the case for a regional housing strategy for 8 localities (Beaufort County, Jasper County, the Town of Hilton Head, the Town of Bluffton, the City of Hardeeville, the Town of Yemassee, the Town of Port Royal, and the City of Beaufort)
- October 2022: 8 jurisdictions approve formation of this regional housing trust fund
- The Beaufort Jasper Housing Trust is a nonprofit with its own Board of Directors, and each locality appoints a board member.
- Revenue Sources: City and County funds, a mix of private and public funds

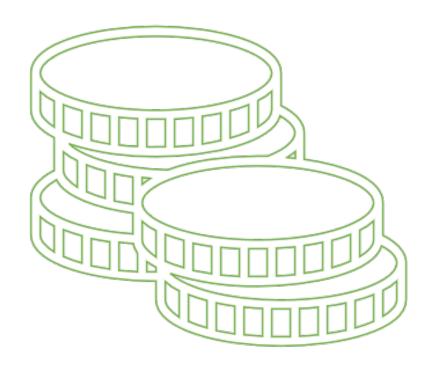
Housing Trust Funds: Primary Funding and Expenditures in Metro Atlanta

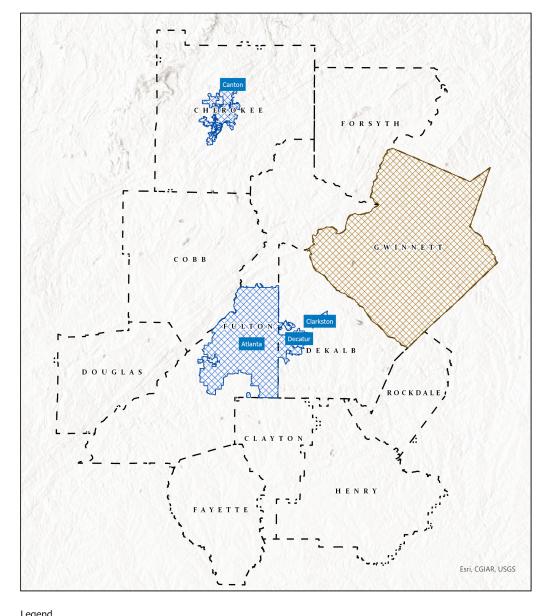

Local Housing Trust Funds: City of Atlanta

Affordable Housing Trust Fund

- Annual funding through City of Atlanta General Fund
- Goal of 2% of budget, established as annual funding
- - \$8M to Affordable Housing Production
 - #\$5M to Housing Security Programs
- Production, preservation, and rehabilitation of affordable housing, property acquisition, programmatic efforts
- Combined with Housing Opportunity Bond to fund The Melody (40 rapid housing units)
- HTF donation helped to fund administrative costs for 21 permanently affordable for-sale townhomes near Westside Park





Local Housing Trust Funds: City of Atlanta

- Westside Affordable Housing Trust Fund
 - Allocated funding to the Metro Atlanta Land Bank
 - Purpose: promote returning vacant and dilapidated property for use on Westside
- Beltline Affordable Housing Trust Fund (BAHTF)
 - Funded through bond allocation, 2016
 - \$10M expenditures investment in new affordable housing development
- Gulch/Centennial Yards Housing Trust Fund
 - Adopted October, 2024
 - Set up to appropriate In-Lieu fees from TAD development
 - Supports anti-displacement, tax relief





Local Housing Trust Fund: Canton

- Established 2022
- Initial trust fund funding: \$100,000 from ARPA Funds
- ↓ Voluntary In-Lieu Fees Developer Contributions
- "A new Housing Trust Fund to be managed by a new Housing & Residential Services Manager will work to assist with programs of housing security for low to moderate income residents, improving public housing, remediating blighted residential properties, first-time homebuyer assistance programs, and overall concierge services for residential needs."
- Housing Trust Fund used primarily for pre-design work, staff can bring recommendations to City Council
- Downpayment assistance is being issued by the City of Canton.





Local Housing Trust Fund: Clarkston

- Established in December 2019
- Initial funding donation of \$200,000
- To be used for affordable housing programs in the City of Clarkston
 - Rent assistance
 - Mortgage assistance
- Goal to address home purchase by providing funds for mortgage assistance, stabilize residents through rental assistance





Local Housing Trust Fund: Decatur

- Established 2008
- Current value approximately \$650,000
- Funded through:
 - Development Agreements
 - General Funds: \$100k per year
- Eligible Activities: (Non-profit agencies, public agencies, for-profit partners)
 - Land or property acquisition
 - Construction costs, predevelopment costs, permitting costs
 - Financial assistance to owners or renters of lifecycle dwellings
 - Other activities related to creating / preserving affordable housing





Housing Trust Fund vs. Affordable Housing Development Fund

Local Housing Trust Fund (HTF):

- ♣ Broad, flexible tool with a dedicated ongoing revenue source for a wide range of affordable housing needs (development, rehab, rental assistance, preservation).
- Designed as a long-term, sustainable funding mechanism for housing affordability.
- Locally controlled, allowing communities to tailor investments to their specific housing priorities.

Affordable Housing Development Fund:

- Primarily supports capital investment (land, construction, gap financing) to expand the affordable housing supply.
- More project-specific, usually tied to discrete developments rather than a broad portfolio of housing programs.





Affordable Housing Development Fund Creation

Gwinnett Affordable Housing Development Fund

- Deployed \$21 million from ARPA and HOME Investment Partnership Program
- Average investment \$20,000 per unit
- 65-80% AMI
- First ribbon cutting: Sage 5430 Apartments, September 2025
 - 70 units: affordability set asides 50%, 60%, 70% AMI
 - Senior residences
 - Mix of affordable and market rate



Legacy at Walton Crossing, Gwinnett



Atlanta Urban Development Corporation

- Atlanta Urban Development Corporation (Incorporated 2023)
- Housing Authority incorporated the Atlanta Urban Development Corporation (AUD), a nonprofit subsidiary of the Housing Authority that serves as a co-development entity for public land projects.
 - Intergovernmental Agreements (IGA)
 - Mixed-Income: 30% Units at 50-80% AMI
 - Home Ownership: 80-120% AMI



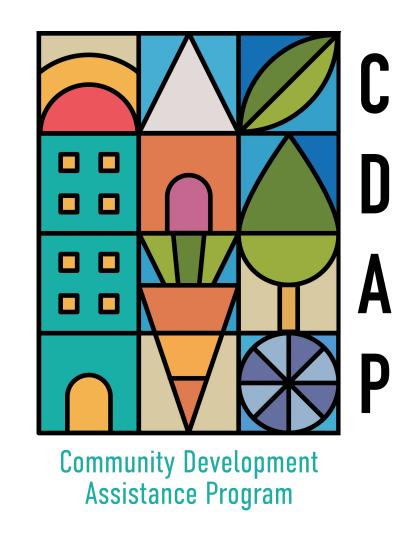
The Atlanta Urban Development Corporation (AUDC) and Atlanta Public Schools (APS) announced a groundbreaking Inter-Governmental Agreement (IGA) to redevelop eight surplus school properties across the city.





ARC's Community Development Assistance Program

- One region. Many communities
- The Community Development Assistance Program (CDAP)
 - Provides planning assistance to local governments, CIDs, & non-profits across the metro Atlanta region
 - CDAP projects help undertake local planning activities
 - Advance the goals of ARC's regional planning initiatives
- **1** 2024 CDAP Project: Adopted September 2025
 - Decatur Preservation Strategies for Naturally Occurring Affordable Housing
 - Assistance Partner: Georgia Conservancy
 - Focus on NOAH housing stock to identify policies and strategies that incentivize the preservation of this limited housing stock.





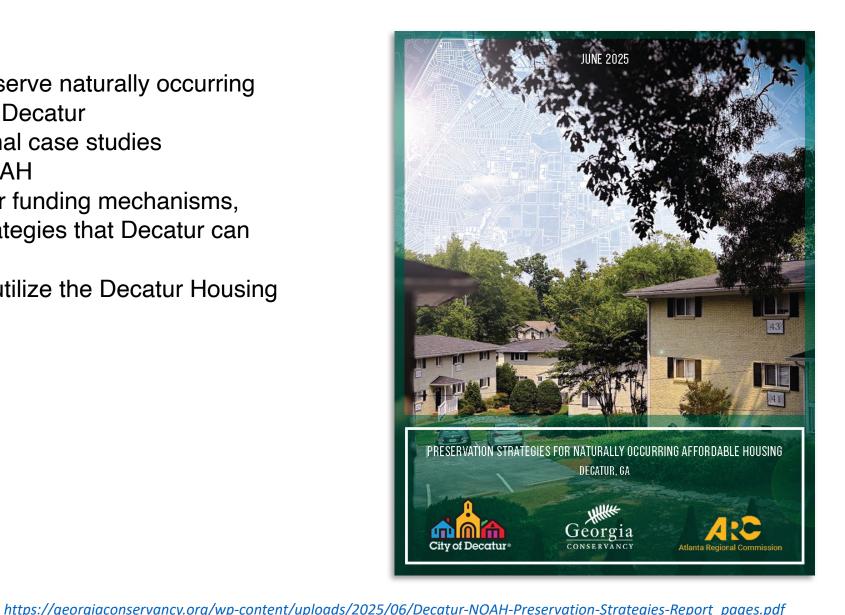

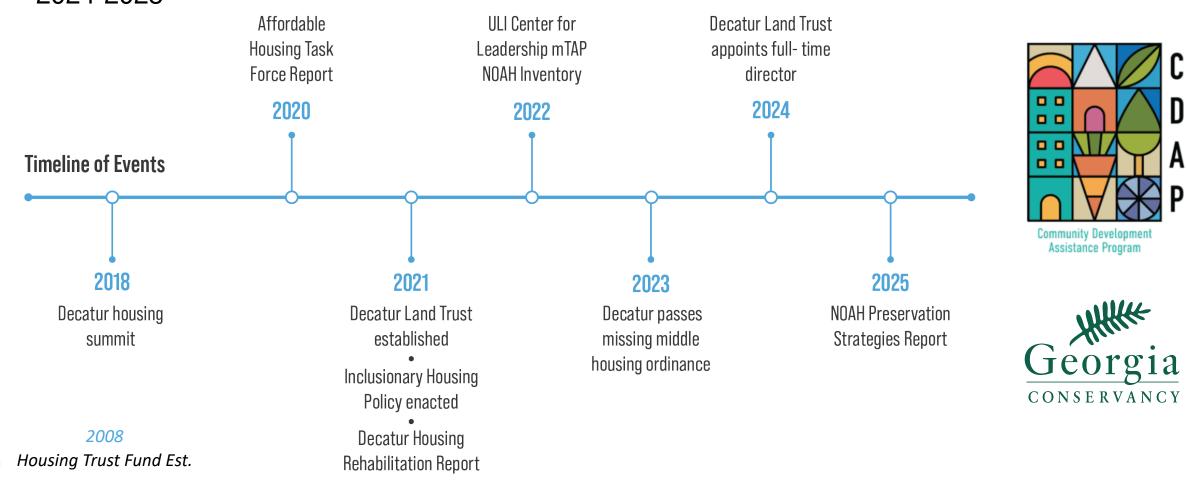

Atlanta Regional Commission - Community Development Assistance Program (ARC-CDAP) 2024-2025



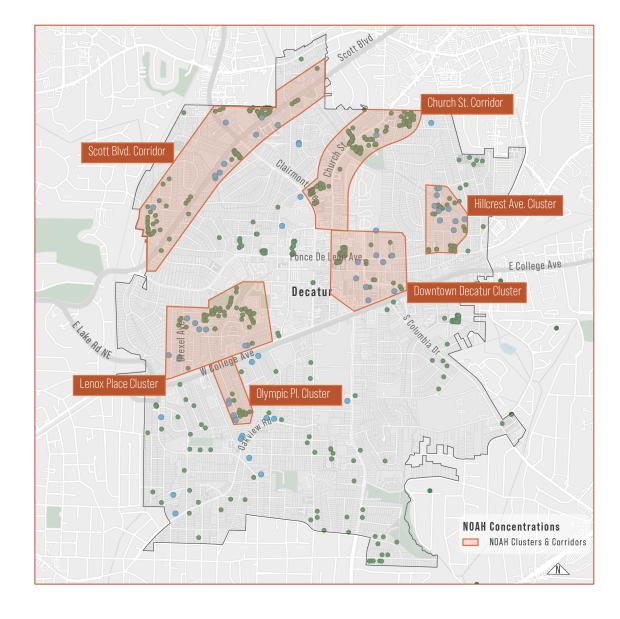


NOAH Inventory

Why is it important?

Keep track of remaining NOAH units and properties Target preservation strategies to specific properties or general locations

- What was considered NOAH?
 - Rental: Affordable to 80% AMI or lower households
 - For-Sale: Affordable to 120% AMI or lower households
 - FY 2024 income limits re-published by Invest Atlanta

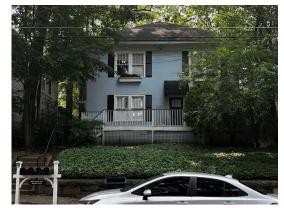
























Decatur Housing Trust Fund

Established 2008
Began receiving funding some years later
Funded through general appropriations at \$100,000 per year
Currently holds over \$600,000

- Eligible applicants:
 - 501(c)3 nonprofit organizations
 - Public agencies
 - Private entities working in partnership with a nonprofit organization

- Wide range of eligible uses:
 - Land or property acquisition for new dev
 - Construction costs for renovation, rehab and new cons.
 - Predevelopment costs
 - Permitting costs
 - Direct owner/renter assistance
 - Any other purpose that helps address the City's goals and priorities of creating and preserving affordable housing



How can the Decatur Housing Trust Fund be Used?

Funds not yet distributed, allocations from the general budget continue consistently A source of seed funding could be applied for to boost the HTF

The HTF can be used to leverage other funding

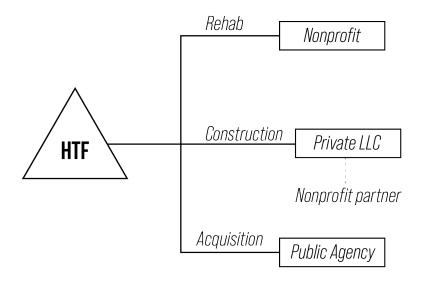
Loan and grant terms may need to be defined (currently case by case basis)

- HTF could disburse funds per request
- HTF could disburse funds into buckets (different programs for different purposes and end users)

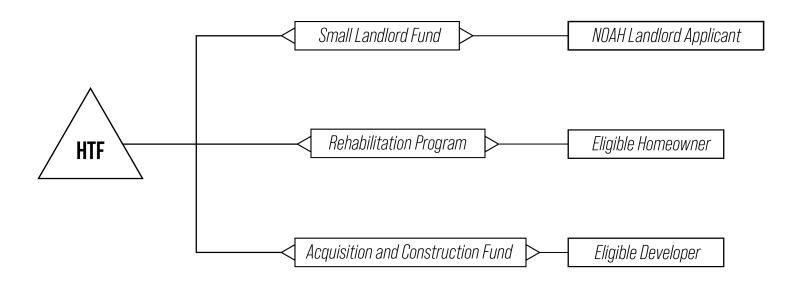


Two Paths for distribution of HTF Funds

CASE BY CASE HTF DISTRIBUTION

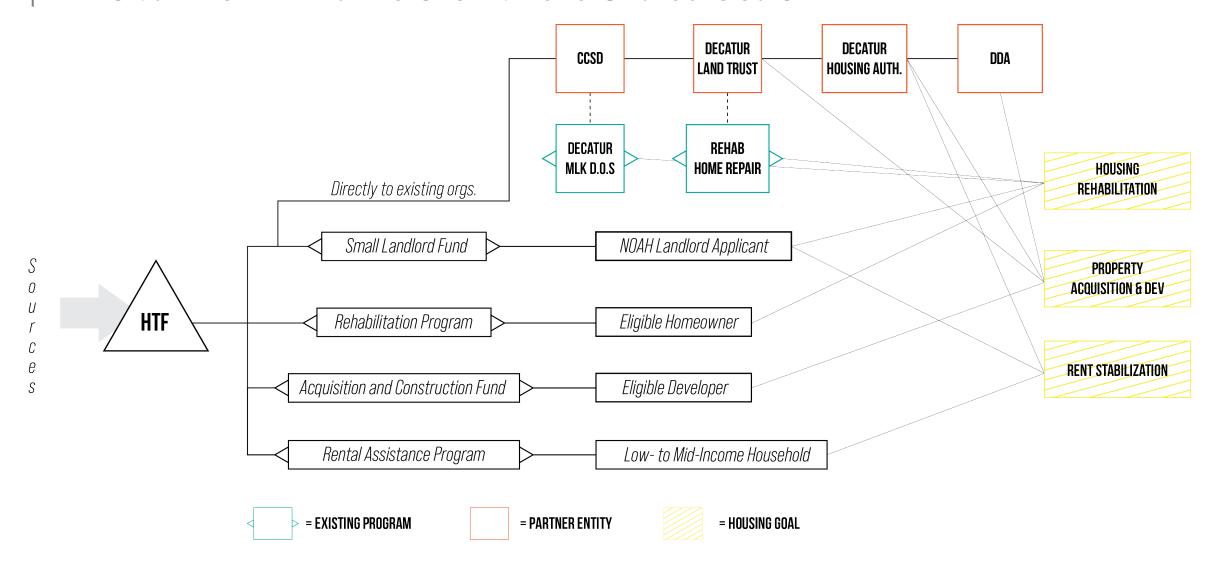


HTF DISTRIBUTION THROUGH PROGRAMS

Next Steps for Decatur – Housing Trust Funds

Explore opportunities to acquire seed funds for the HTF

Determine if there will be any programs, or specific buckets of funds, that the HTF will supply

Determine loan repayment terms and conditions

Report annually on sources and expenditures of the HTF

Advocate for permission for new sources of dedicated revenue





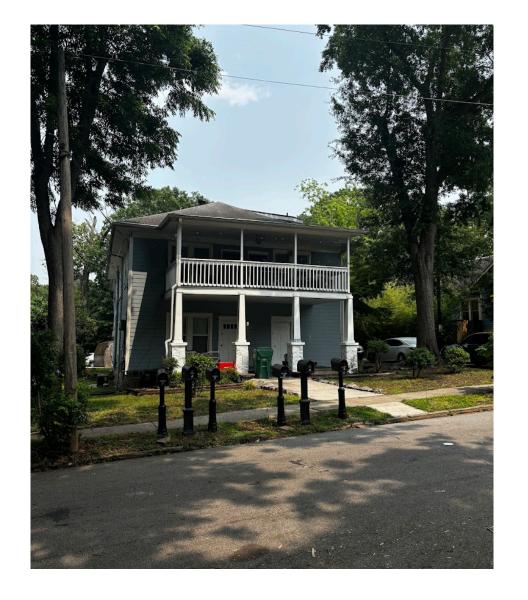
Next Steps for Decatur

Leverage an ecosystem of partner agencies that share housing goals (DDA, Land Trust, Housing Authority, Land Bank)

Ideally for acquisition and management of affordable properties

Advocate at the state level for direct PILOT programs and/or preferential assessment programs for NOAH

Offer trainings and assistance to NOAH condominium properties

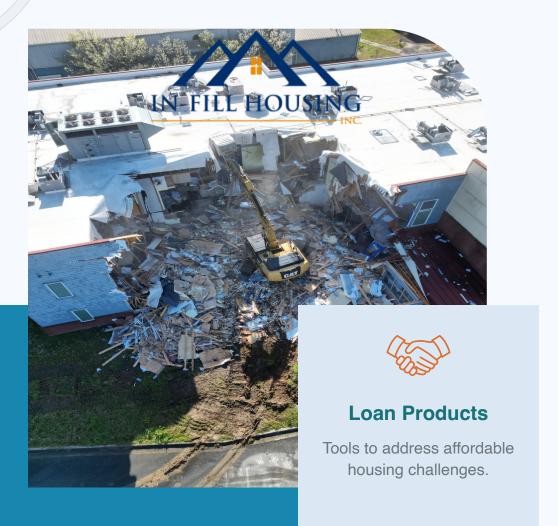

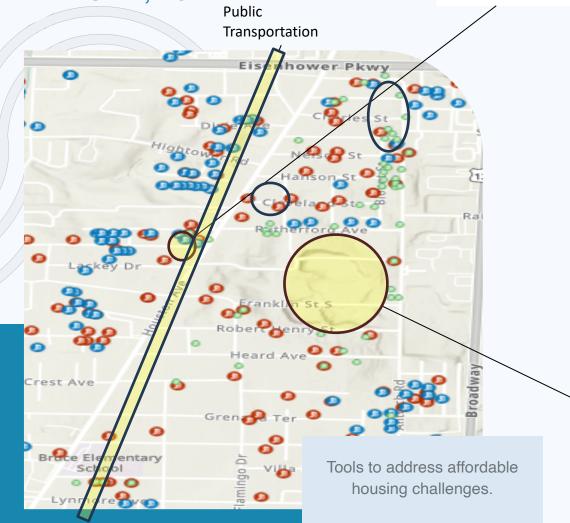
